## **Group Project Presentations**

This handout clarifies the nature of the group project assignment.

**A. CHOOSE TOPIC.** Your job is to present to the class <u>one or more theories</u> regarding small group communication <u>in a specific kind of context</u>. The theory/concepts should meet the following criteria:

- 1. They should be interesting and challenging to the students.
- 2. There should be an existing academic literature on these theories.

The context should be:

- 1. One that involves a common or uniquely important kind of small groups.
- 2. One on which there is sufficient scholarly or popular literature.

When your group has identified a potential theory and context, run it by me for approval, and I will assess the proposed idea in light of these criteria.

**B. PREPARE PRESENTATION.** Once you have a topic, you will begin working on a class presentation that will introduce your theory and context to the class.

The presentation should include these elements:

- 1. Explanation of the background of this theory. How did it arise?
- 2. Description of the theory—it's core concepts and claims.
- 3. Description of the context in which you apply the theory. Why is it important?
- 4. The research and evidence in support of the value of the theory in group context you have chosen.
- 5. An in-class exercise that has the class do an activity that helps them understand the theory. This may involve the class breaking into smaller groups.
- 6. Conclude by stressing the relevance of the theory and how it helps us understand groups in this context.

**C. TURN IN MATERIALS.** Immediately after the presentation, you should turn in the following materials:

- 1. An annotated bibliography of <u>at least twenty</u> sources used in developing your presentation. The research that goes into your presentation requires the inclusion of <u>at least ten peer-reviewed articles</u> relevant to your subject. An additional ten sources can include books, chapters, news/magazine articles, and/or more peer-reviewed articles.
- 2. A complete outline of your presentation. (If you use PowerPoint, include a printout of your slides.) This will probably be 2-5 pages.
- 3. A written description of your in-class exercise. This is probably 1-3 pages.

**D. GRADE.** Your grade on this assignment will be determined by the quality of your in-class presentation and the materials you turn in with that presentation. Group members will also be asked to privately assess member participation; an individual member may have his/her grade reduced if that person did not make satisfactory contributions to the group effort.
